We thank You for those in our church fellowship who have been reaching out to those who may be feeling very isolated and fearful during Covid restrictions. May their focus be on a God who is love and is beside them every moment of the day and night, and is holding them closely.

Although our schools have been closed for so long in Auckland, we give thanks for those education facilities that have been open and programmes like Launchpad have been continuing in other parts of New Zealand. We pray that Youth leaders in our churches will continue to connect with their young ones despite camps being closed and their programmes been thwarted.

As the Christmas and holiday period approaches in about seven weeks we are aware that there are folk in the fellowship who are longing to see their family, but restrictions may hold back seeing those who are overseas and travel between borders will be restricted, but we give thanks for electronic means to keep in touch.

Thank You Lord for Your great love, for Your grace that we don't deserve, and for the renewed hope, power and vision you give us daily.

"As a young teenager in the 60s I lived a pretty normal life; college, a local church youth group, Boys' Brigade, music was important to me, and I started my printing apprenticeship at 16. When I was 17 I attended a Bible class Easter camp where I was challenged by the good news message of Christ's death for me, but resisted God's calling. Later that year at a Boys' brigade camp, again I believe God was confronting me, to commit my life to follow Him. I did, I asked Christ's forgiveness for the sin in me and invited Him into my life.

There were changes, it gave me new direction in a number of areas that I haven't forgotten. My sister said later she had seen a change in me after that. I thank God, it is a decision I have never regretted.

The Masterton Baptist Church taught me to "trust and obey," and I know the Lord had His hand on my life. A group of us formed a Gospel band, and shared our faith through music around the Wairarapa and Wellington areas. I met Rachel about this time, and we were married in 1972.

Through a number of events the Lord led us to take two years out to study at Bible College in preparation for missionary work, at that stage it was looking like Quito, Ecuador. It was at this point we met David and Glenis Maindonald, wondering if the Lord had HCJB in mind for us, there was a print shop there. We moved to Auckland and spent two years at BCNZ. While there we became involved in Open Air Campaigners, and later spent time helping at the OAC

outreach meetings in the city as part of a music team. I believe that although we didn't go to the mission field, we have been able to serve God in a support role for mission work at home.

I think the important things in my life these days are my wife and family, my music, my printing, and my walk with the Lord. At last Tuesday's Insight study group two words stuck with me especially. Strive for 'godliness,' rather than worldliness, and 'gentleness,' be a gentleman for God to those He brings my way. May I be faithful to Him who is faithful to me everyday."

7¹ After this, Jesus went around in Galilee. He did not want to go about in Judea because the Jewish leaders there were looking for a way to kill him.² But when the Jewish Festival of Tabernacles was near, ³ Jesus' brothers said to him, "Leave Galilee and go to Judea, so that your disciples there may see the works you do. ⁴ No one who wants to become a public figure acts in secret. Since you are doing these things, show yourself to the world." ⁵ For even his own brothers did not believe in him.

⁶ Therefore Jesus told them, "My time is not yet here; for you any time will do. ⁷ The world cannot hate you, but it hates me because I testify that its works are evil. ⁸ You go to the festival. I am not going up to this festival, because my time has not yet fully come." ⁹ After he had said this, he stayed in Galilee.

¹⁰ However, after his brothers had left for the festival, he went also, not publicly, but in secret. ¹¹ Now at the festival the Jewish leaders were watching for Jesus and asking, "Where is he?"

¹² Among the crowds there was widespread whispering about him. Some said, "He is a good man."

Others replied, "No, he deceives the people." ¹³ But no one would say anything publicly about him for fear of the leaders.
