TESTIMONY (Jo Lima)

"Brian asked me to share about something that God's been doing in my life recently. I've chosen one thing that I've been really struck by. Every year, early in January, I set out to articulate goals for the coming year. Some of these things have to do with my ministry and ties in with my role description. But one category in my planning has to do with identifying goals for personal growth.

We can so easily get comfortable and think we are doing pretty well really. Maybe we've seen real growth, or fruit of God's spirit at work in us, or we've had a lot of encouragement from others that makes us feel pretty confident. But because we're working through the book of James, I was reading through the book again – and I was struck by how direct James is. He's not subtle – he doesn't leave us guessing about the issues he's wanting to address. And once again – as is so often the case when we allow God to speak to us through his word – I felt so convicted of the need for action rather than knowledge. For faith, rather than logic. For obedience rather than "being right". So as I've been thinking about goals for this coming year in terms of my own growth and walk with Jesus, I'm keeping it simple. As James notes, there are lots of distractions – even really good distractions – like theological knowledge, ministry – but am I already acting on what I know? Am I being obedient to what God has already shown me?

So as I'm setting goals this year, I am committed to the basics of walking humbly with God. Reading Scripture, praying, and being obedient to God's prompting and leading in my life. I'm grateful for God's reminder – through the book of James – that our faith is extremely practical."

BIBLE READING James 1:19-27

Listening and Doing

1¹⁹ My dear brothers and sisters, take note of this: Everyone should be quick to listen, slow to speak and slow to become angry, ²⁰ because human anger does not produce the righteousness that God desires. ²¹ Therefore, get rid of all moral filth and the evil that is so prevalent and humbly accept the word planted in you, which can save you.

²² Do not merely listen to the word, and so deceive yourselves. Do what it says. ²³ Anyone who listens to the word but does not do what it says is like someone who looks at his face in a mirror ²⁴ and, after looking at himself, goes away and immediately forgets what he looks like. ²⁵ But whoever looks intently into the perfect law that gives freedom, and continues in it—not forgetting what they have heard, but doing it—they will be blessed in what they do.

²⁶ Those who consider themselves religious and yet do not keep a tight rein on their tongues deceive themselves, and their religion is worthless. ²⁷ Religion that God our Father accepts as pure and faultless is this: to look after orphans and widows in their distress and to keep oneself from being polluted by the world.
